PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS (PATH) AGREEMENT

I hereby certify that the State/Territory of Pennsylvania agrees to the following:

Section 522(a). Amounts received under the PATH Formula Grant Program will be expended solely for making grants to political subdivisions of the State, and to nonprofit private entities (including community-based veterans organizations and other community organizations) for the purpose of providing the services specified in Section 522(b) to individuals who:

- · Are suffering from serious mental illness; or
- Are suffering from serious mental illness and from a substance use disorder; and
- · Are homeless or at imminent risk of becoming homeless.

Section 522(b). Entities receiving grants under the PATH Formula Grant Program will expend funds for the following services:

- Outreach;
- · Screening and diagnostic treatment;
- · Habilitation and rehabilitation;
- · Community mental health;
- · Alcohol or drug treatment;
- Staff training, including the training of individuals who work in shelters, mental health clinics, substance abuse programs, and other sites where homeless individuals require services;
- · Case management services, including:
 - Preparing a plan for the provision of community mental health services to the eligible homeless individual involved, and reviewing such plan not less than once every 3 months;
 - Providing assistance in obtaining and coordinating social and maintenance services for the eligible homeless individuals, including services relating to daily living activities, personal financial planning, transportation services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services, prevocational and vocational services, and housing;
 - Providing assistance to the eligible homeless individual in obtaining income support services, including housing assistance, food stamps, and supplemental security income benefits;
 - · Referring the eligible homeless individual for such other services as may be appropriate; and
 - Providing representative payee services in accordance with Section 1631(a) (2) of the Social Security Act if the eligible homeless individual is receiving aid under Title XVI of such act and if the applicant is designated by the Secretary to provide such services.
- · Supportive and supervisory services in residential settings;
- · Referrals for primary health services, job training, education services and relevant housing services;
- Housing services [subject to Section 522(h)(1)] including:
 - · Minor renovation, expansion, and repair of housing;
 - Planning of housing;
 - · Technical assistance in applying for housing assistance;
 - · Improving the coordination of housing services;
 - Security deposits;
 - The costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing situations;
 - · One-time rental payments to prevent eviction; and
- Other appropriate services, as determined by the Secretary.

Section 522(c). The State will make grants pursuant to Section 522(a) only to entities that have the capacity to provide, directly through arrangements, the services specified in Section 522(b), including coordinating the provision of services in order to meet the needs of eligible homeless individuals who are both mentally ill and suffering from a substance abuse disorder.

Section 522(d). In making grants to entities pursuant to Section 522(a), the State will give special consideration to entities with a demonstrated effectiveness in serving homeless veterans.

Section 522(e). The state agrees that grants pursuant to Section 522(a) will not be made to any entity that:

- · Has a policy of excluding individuals from mental health services due to the existence or suspicion of a substance use disorder; or
- · Has a policy of excluding individuals from substance use services due to the existence or suspicion of mental illness.

Section 522(f). Not more than four (4) percent of the payments received under the PATH Formula Grant Program will be expended for administrative expenses regarding the payments.

Section 522(h). The State agrees that not more than 20 percent of the payments will be expended for housing services under section 522(b)(10); and the payments will not be expended for the following:

- To support emergency shelters or construction of housing facilities;
- · For inpatient psychiatric treatment costs or inpatient substance use treatment costs; or
- · To make cash payments to intended recipients of mental health or substance use services.

Section 523(a). The State will make available, directly or through donations from public or private entities, non-Federal contributions toward such costs in an amount that is not less than \$1 for each \$3 of funds provided in such payments. The amount of non-Federal contributions shall be determined in accordance with Section 523(b).

Section 523(c). The State will not require the entities to which grants are provided pursuant to Section 522(a) to provide non-Federal contributions in excess of the non-Federal contributions described in Section 523(a).

Section 526. The State has attached hereto a Statement that does the following:

- Identifies existing programs providing services and housing to eligible homeless individuals and gaps in the delivery systems of such programs;
- Includes a plan for providing services and housing to eligible homeless individuals, which:
 - Describes the coordinated and comprehensive means of providing services and housing to homeless individuals; and
 - Includes documentation that suitable housing for eligible homeless individuals will accompany the provision of services to such individuals;
- Describes the source of the non-Federal contributions described in Section 523;
- Contains assurances that the non-Federal contributions described in Section 523 will be available at the beginning of the grant period;
- · Describes any voucher system that may be used to carry out this part; and

Provide an overview of the state's PATH program with key points that are expanded upon in the State Level Sections of WebBGAS.

The Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS) Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) partners with 33 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties to provide PATH services. Some counties utilize a joinder system to pool services and resources across multiple counties under one local government entity. Pennsylvania contracts with 25 local Mental Health/Intellectual Disability (MH/ID) county/joinder program offices to distribute PATH funds and assist with monitoring the 34 PATH projects across the Commonwealth to ensure each project is meeting local community service gaps and needs. Most of the MH/ID program offices that receive the PATH grant, sub-contract with appropriate local community sources to provide either some or all PATH services in the area. The local provider intended use plans (IUPs) will identify the county MH/ID programs that sub-contract, in whole or part, with other community providers and those that directly operate the program in their area.

All PATH programs provide services to PATH-eligible adults ages 18 and over. The counties and contracted providers have developed innovative PATH programming to best serve the needs of individuals with a serious mental illness (SMI) or co-occurring disorder who are experiencing or are at imminent risk of homelessness in their geographical areas. Most, if not all, of Pennsylvania's PATH providers strive to offer evidence-based practices in service provision. In general, the services provided to PATH-eligible individuals include outreach, screening and diagnostic treatment, habilitation/rehabilitation, community mental health services, alcohol and/or drug treatment, staff training, case management, supportive and supervisory services in residential settings, and referrals for primary health, job training, education services, and allowable housing services.

Additionally, the Pennsylvania PATH State Team Lead is also the SOAR State Team Lead. Pennsylvania is partnering with the SAMHSA SOAR Technical Assistance Center, Policy Research Associates, to build out a comprehensive statewide SOAR initiative to grow the model and increase access and awareness across the state. Connection to a SOAR trained caseworker is sought-after by individuals with an SMI that are experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Pennsylvania. At the State level, we recognize the key relationship between PATH and SOAR and each playing a key role in assisting individuals to maximize income supports through benefits access and employment support to achieve long-term housing stability.

Pennsylvania's PATH Program is county-based, with program leadership at the state level provided by the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS). The significant funding breakouts in the budget are for the State PATH Contact under OMHSAS, the HMIS system, support and training, and the Intended Use Plans for each county with a PATH program and the individual program providers within the counties. The details of the Budget are expressed below. The state provides additional support by covering the travel required for the SPC to visit, review, and support the individual programs annually.

Personnel (\$59,149): \$59,149 is the annual salary of the State PATH Contact who functions within the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health and Substance Use Services, under the title of Human Services Analyst in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The federal PATH-funded portion of the salary is \$55,008, which approximates 93% of FTE, however, 100% of the SPC's time is spent on PATH. The statematched portion is \$4,141.

Fringe Benefits (\$46,073): \$46,073 is the SPC's fringe benefits total, including \$41,992 in federal dollars and \$4,081 in matched dollars. Fringe benefits include medical benefits, unemployment contributions, retirement benefits, etc.

Contractual (IUPs) (\$3,558,748): The IUPs are provided by the 33 programs delivering services in 25 county/joinders under the PATH program. This is where most of the grant dollars are committed. The total portion of the PATH grant for this section is \$3,558,748, which includes \$2,270,874 in Federal Dollars and the state matching with \$797,038, but additional funding of \$490,836 from Counties in support of the PATH program are also included, bringing the state total up to \$1,287,874. The PA Office of the Comptrollers initiates the state portion of \$797,038. While individual counties provide additional funds over and above the required match to support their respective programs, only a portion of the support provided to serve populations experiencing homelessness is reflected in the budget.

Other (\$67,908): Includes the Federal Dollar amount of \$62,908 and Matched Dollars of \$5,000 to support HMIS, HMIS data collection and training, and other PATH-related training as possible with these funds.

Individual Experiencing Homelessness:	Pennsylvania follows the definition for an Individual Experiencing Homelessness as provided under the PHS Act, Section 330(h)(5)(A) for its simplicity of statement and expansiveness of meaning. This section states: "an individual who lacks housing (without regard to whether the individual is a member of a family), including an individual whose primary residence during the night is a supervised public or private facility that provides temporary living accommodations, and an individual who is a resident in transitional housing."
Imminent Risk of Becoming Homeless:	The U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness defines Imminent Risk of Homelessness as individuals or families, 1) whose residence will be lost within 14 days; 2) that no subsequent residence has been identified, and 3) who lack the resources or support networks to obtain permanent housing. One or more of the following criteria commonly applies to an individual facing imminent homelessness: doubled-up living arrangements where the individual's name is not on a lease, living in a condemned building without a place to move, having arrears in rent/utility payments, receiving an eviction notice without a place to move, living in temporary or transitional housing that carries time limits, or being discharged from a health care or criminal justice institution without a place to live.
Serious Mental Illness (SMI):	Serious Mental Illness applies to adults 18 years old and over who currently, or at any time during the past year, have had a diagnosable mental, behavioral, or emotional disorder of sufficient duration to meet diagnostic criteria, that has resulted in functional impairment which substantially interferes with or limits one or more major life activities.
Co-occurring Disorders (COD):	Refers to individuals who have any combination of two or more substance use disorders and mental disorders identified in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, Fifth Edition (DSM-5) or as adapted to subsequent editions.

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Introduction

The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. HUD requires that Continuums of Care (CoCs) conduct an annual count of people experiencing homelessness who are sheltered in emergency shelter, transitional housing, and Safe Havens on a single night. Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally.

The 2023 PIT count reported 12,556 Pennsylvanians experienced homelessness on a single night in January in both sheltered and unsheltered settings. This was a 1.1% decrease from 2022, however, the data from 2021-2022 included a staggering 21.4% increase. Many CoCs chose to not conduct a full unsheltered PIT count in 2021 or conducted a partial unsheltered count, as HUD encouraged communities to determine whether conducting an unsheltered PIT count posed a high risk of exacerbating COVID-19 transmissions, given the lack of widespread access to COVID-19 vaccines at the time. This likely artificially reduced the overall count of people experiencing homelessness in Pennsylvania and the United States. In 2022, HUD required all communities that did not conduct an unsheltered PIT count in 2021 were to conduct an unsheltered count. As a result, in 2022, nationally 371 CoCs conducted a full sheltered and unsheltered count and 16 CoCs conducted a sheltered-only count. The 2021 PIT count data on the number and characteristics of people experiencing unsheltered 16 CoCs was carried over for the 2022 PIT data. This information is derived from the 2022 Annual Homelessness Assessment Report (AHAR) to Congress. Information specific to Pennsylvania's increase from the 2021-2022 PIT count was not readily available.

Additionally, the end of the Federal Eviction Moratorium in August 2021 greatly heightened the risk of displacement for millions of renters nationally. The rollout of the Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) program likely prevented a substantial increase in deep housing insecurity and homelessness. Between the end of the Federal Eviction Moratorium in August 2021 and the PIT count in January 2022 HUD estimates just over 12 million renter households applied for and received ERA. Tightening rental market conditions likely increased strain on renter households especially those at risk of falling into homelessness. HUD analysis shows that as of August 2022 nearly 12% of all renters had their rent increased by \$250 or more in the year after the end of the Federal Eviction Moratorium.

In Pennsylvania, emphasis is placed on PATH projects to coordinate and collaborate with their local CoCs to identify and fill the gap of mainstream services and to allow for provision of much needed outreach and case management services to individuals with an SMI that are experiencing or at risk of homelessness. Of the 16 CoCs across the state, 12 have active PATH projects that play an integral role in provision of services. PATH providers are expected to offer low barrier access to individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness to develop relationships fostering trust and respect for autonomy. This model allows for maximum engagement with individuals that may be service resistant in harder to reach areas, such as encampments, shelters, and drop-in centers. Many PATH providers offer services during nontraditional business hours to serve those that many mainstream services cannot under existing models.

Bridges to Success: Keystones of Health for Pennsylvania

The Pennsylvania Department of Human Services submitted a Section 1115 demonstration waiver application, titled "Bridges to Success: Keystones of Health for Pennsylvania" (Keystones of Health) to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services on January 26, 2024. PA DHS' mission is to help all Pennsylvanians live healthy, enriching, and vibrant lives. As part of this work, DHS seeks to use its Medicaid program to offer targeted supports and services to certain Pennsylvanians through Keystones of Health. Social determinants of health can be more influential on a person's health and quality of life than clinical care. DHS hopes to use this program to make health care more accessible, improve quality of care and services, and test new strategies in health care to help people live healthier lives. The demonstration aims to address the health care needs of Pennsylvanians in four main areas: Reentry Supports, Housing Supports, Food and Nutrition Supports, and Continuous Coverage for Children Under Age Six.

The PATH State Contact participates in the DHS Internal Steering Committee that seeks to address the housing needs of Pennsylvanians. The PATH State Contact coordinates with local PATH providers to gain insight into the needs of, and advocate on behalf of, adults with an SMI that are experiencing or at risk of homelessness. Individuals experiencing homelessness are often faced with chronic health conditions, impacting both mental and physical well-being. Stable housing, a recognized cornerstone of good health, can serve as a bridge for homeless adults with chronic illnesses, which has led to a nearly 30% reduction in hospital stays in other regions across the US. Keystones of Health proposes to add new Medicaid services to help beneficiaries without stable housing find and keep a place to live. Having stable housing makes it easier to find and use health care. These services will focus on beneficiaries with behavioral health issues and chronic conditions where health outcomes are greatly impacted by improved consistency of care and medication access.

A critical component of Keystones of Health will change current Medicaid policy to allow incarcerated individuals who are preparing for release to access coverage and limited benefits 90 calendar days prior to release as well as continued reentry supports following release. To be eligible for this service, an individual must meet one or more of the identified criteria for high risk, including those that have serious mental illness. Case management coupled with housing and tenancy supports for up to six months will be provided. This service will encompass pre-tenancy and tenancy sustaining assistance including post transition housing, education and navigation, and coverage of one-time transition and moving costs. Support may also include housing deposits, including application and inspection fees and fees for obtaining necessary identification.

Gaining access to stable and affordable housing is crucial for successful reentry into society after being incarcerated. People who experience homelessness post release are more likely to get arrested than those who have a stable home. Those who leave jail or prison and end up in emergency shelters or on the streets have a higher likelihood of reoffending, and this association between homelessness and contact with the criminal justice system is often complicated by mental and behavioral health issues. This piece of the demonstration will assist PATH projects across the Commonwealth to reduce the strain on the current homeless system as Medicaid has the potential to provide the added support individuals exiting correction institutions oftentimes need to prevent a housing crisis post release.

Another critical component of the Keystones of Health demonstration is individuals experiencing homelessness who also have serious mental illness or substance use disorder will have access to a package of supportive services that cover and facilitate the housing search, transition into stable housing, and maintenance of that situation. Without support, oftentimes, each step in the housing process can constitute a significant barrier to housing stability for our PATH eligible individuals. The package of assistance for PATH eligible individuals will include:

- 1. **Pre-tenancy and transition navigation and case management, including connection to housing specialists** – This service provides beneficiaries with navigation and case management services including local housing specialists for pre-tenancy and transition services. This involves assisting beneficiaries with connections to local, state, and federal benefit programs, helping with benefit program applications, and covering application fees to find and maintain stable housing.
- 2. **One-time transition start-up services (moving costs, initial furnishings)** This service will cover one-time transition and moving costs, such as, but not limited to, security deposits, first-month's rent, utility activation fees, movers, relocation expenses, pest control, and purchasing household goods and furniture. Additionally, it will provide deposits to secure housing, covering the application fees, inspection fees, and fees for obtaining necessary identification.
- 3. **Rental subsidies for up to six months** Rental subsidies may include payment of rental assistance as well as temporary housing assistance for up to six months.
- 4. **Tenancy sustaining services** These services will provide assistance and guidance to beneficiaries including tenant rights education and eviction mitigation support.

PATH programs across Pennsylvania will play an essential role in access to Keystones of Health as an individual must be a Medicaid beneficiary to obtain benefits of the 1115 Demonstration. As stated previously, PATH provides services and resource coordination to fill the gap of existing mainstream services and can bridge the gap prior to enrollment in Medicaid services. Every PATH provider across Pennsylvania prioritizes benefits coordination including enrollment in an eligible health plan as a critical piece of an individualized service plan. People experiencing homelessness who have a serious mental illness, substance use disorder, and people reentering society from correctional institutions are identified as potential target populations for the Keystones of Health initiative which overlaps PATH eligibility.

Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development

The Department of Community and Economic Development's (DCED) mission is to encourage the shared prosperity of all Pennsylvanians by supporting good stewardship and sustainable development initiatives across the Commonwealth. With a keen eye toward diversity and inclusiveness, DCED acts as advisors and advocates, providing strategic technical assistance, training, and financial resources to help our communities and industries flourish. DCED coordinates the housing efforts for the State and serves as the lead agency for the Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for federal funding to support various community development programs. DCED follows a Housing First approach by ensuring people experiencing a housing crisis are quickly connected to permanent housing whereby supportive services are offered, but participation is not required. Services have been found to be more effective when a person chooses to engage rather than is required to as a contingency to obtaining and maintaining housing.

Utilizing HUD's Emergency Solutions Grant funding, DCED supports local governments and nonprofit agencies who work to end homelessness quickly and as efficiently as possible for all vulnerable populations. In Pennsylvania, there are local governments that receive a direct allocation of ESG funding from HUD as well as non-entitlement communities that receive prioritization by DCED for ESG funding. Non-entitlement communities include local governments that are not designated by HUD as urban counties or entitlement municipalities.

DCED also serves as the collaborative applicant for 7 of the 16 Pennsylvania Continuums of Care (CoC). HUD's CoC Program is designed to promote community-wide planning and strategic use of resources to address homelessness; improve coordination and integration of mainstream resources with other programs targeted to people experiencing homelessness; improve data collection and performance measurement; and

allow each community to tailor its homeless assistance programs to the strengths and challenges of that community.

The PA Homeless Management Information System is utilized by 19 of the 35 PATH projects funded across the Commonwealth and oversight and administration is provided by DCED. All other PA PATH providers utilize HMIS but are not administered by DCED. The primary goal is to acquire hard data in order to understand the scope and dimensions of homelessness to address the problems more effectively. This benefits service providers and clients' at-risk or experiencing homelessness and enables more efficient use of service through a coordinated entry process. Coordinated entry processes are established by the local Continuums of Care, to ensure the homeless crisis response system is easy to access, the needs of the homeless population are quickly identified and assessed, and priority decisions are based on those identified needs.

Consolidated Plan: HUD requires a new state Consolidated Plan every five years. In Pennsylvania, the Center for Community and Housing Development has the developed a five-year Consolidated Plan for 2024-2028. The Consolidated Plan identifies the housing, community development, homelessness, public service, and economic development needs of the non-entitled municipalities of the Commonwealth. It establishes goals and objectives in addressing those needs and charts the course for expenditure of housing and community development funds over a period of five years in resolving the needs. 2024 – 2028 Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan.

The Consolidated Plan for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (Consolidated Plan) details the efforts of the Commonwealth in addressing the housing, community, homeless and economic development needs of its constituents, with specific focus on extremely low-, low-, and moderate-income persons and communities. The Consolidated Plan is intended to outline the goals, strategies, and resources to be utilized in addressing those needs as well as related information on performance in realizing these goals.

The Pennsylvania Housing Advisory Committee (PHAC) meets at least semiannually, and reviews Statewide housing and support services needs and priorities and advises on the coordination of Federal, State, and local resources. PHAC was established by Act 172 as the planning agency for the development of the Consolidated Plan, and is comprised of state agency representatives, members of the Pennsylvania legislature, as well as members of statewide non-profit and for-profit organizations, human service and housing development organizations, and Regional Housing Advisory Committees (RHAC) chairs. The membership is geographically dispersed to include urban, suburban, and rural areas and every effort is made to ensure a diversity of race, ethnic origin, household composition, age, religion, sex and disability status. In April 2023, PHAC met to discuss the 2023 Action Plan, review the 2023 Methods of Distribution, and provide review and updates on other Federal programs including funds related to: CARES Act, American Rescue Plan, and Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery. On September 7, 2023, PHAC met to discuss the Consolidated Plan process, the Consultation and Needs Summary, draft the Strategic Plan framework, and plan for public participation and review of the plan.

Emergency Solutions Grant: In 2022, HUD reported \$16,127,748.00 in ESG funds to the Commonwealth, of which, DCED administered \$5,914,925 to non-entitlement communities. For 2023, DCED, approved 16 municipal grantees and seven nonprofits which administered regional ESG projects covering 25 counties and one statewide program to address victims of domestic violence. ESG funds emergency shelter and short to medium term housing support services which are often essential to the success of individuals enrolled in PATH.

At the local level, the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) is a key partner for the PATH project as it supports local efforts to help individuals and families that are currently experiencing homelessness, as well as those at risk. ESG serves those individuals and families experiencing a housing crisis with or without a serious mental illness. PATH and ESG are complimentary programs, and are able to service a broader range of Pennsylvanians

to provide basic shelter and essential support services to those in need. ESG funds can be used in a variety of ways to support individuals and families, including victims of domestic abuse, veterans, youth, those with disabilities, and displaced families. Acceptable uses of ESG funds include:

- 1. Street outreach services
- 2. Emergency shelter (includes renovations, operational costs, and essential services)
- 3. Rapid re-housing (services to move households from their homeless situation into stable permanent housing)
- 4. Homelessness prevention (services to assist households at risk of becoming homeless)
- 5. Homeless Management Information System.

Continuum of Care (CoC): In 2023, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania received \$147,967,483 in CoC funds from HUD dispersed across the commonwealth's 16 CoCs. DCED is the Collaborative Applicant for 7 of the 16 CoCs, however, DCED is not involved in the decision-making process for these funds. The CoC program funds projects under five program components: permanent housing; transitional housing; supportive services only; HMIS; and, in some cases, homelessness prevention.

Permanent supportive housing is an evidence-based model that ends the cycle of homelessness to assist individuals with disabilities who have experienced chronic homelessness. In 2023, the PIT count identified 2,843 Pennsylvanians that identified as having an SMI that were either living in shelter or in a place not meant for human habitation. There were 1,810 Pennsylvanians who were identified as chronically homeless, defined as having experienced homelessness for at least a year – or repeatedly – while struggling with a disabling condition such as a serious mental illness, substance use disorder, or physical disability.

Oftentimes, PA PATH providers connect enrolled individuals to PSH projects to provide a long-term affordable housing subsidy, coupled with voluntary case management and supportive services once PATH case management services phase out 90 days post stable housing. The PSH model based in choice of service delivery aligns with the PATH model of choice and autonomy, oftentimes, the transition from PATH to PSH is seamless after a warm handoff between providers as required of all PA PATH providers. Research has shown that permanent supportive housing is an effective solution to combat homelessness among the chronically homeless and helps to enhance housing stability and overall health. This approach is not only cost-effective, but it also reduces public costs that are incurred as a result of relying on crisis services such as shelters, hospitals, jails, and prisons.

Homeless Management Information System (HMIS): All Pennsylvania PATH providers are required to capture data in their HMIS. The more your community knows about a problem, the better equipped community partners are to maximize resources to prevent and resolve the problems at hand. DCED oversees and administers the PA HMIS which is utilized by 19 of the 33 PATH projects funded across the Commonwealth. The 14 PATH projects that do not work with DCED in the PA HMIS, contract with other HMIS providers to meet their unique community needs.

The PATH State Contact frequently coordinates with DCED HMIS Administrators to assist PATH providers utilizing PA HMIS to understand the data entry process and the several nuances of PATH entry such as logging contacts, services, and referrals to receive credit on the PATH Annual Report. The PA PATH State Contact has also requested special technical assistance from DCED to provide one on one training to new PATH providers as well as providers needing additional ongoing support.

For those PATH providers that do not utilize the DCED run PA HMIS system, the PATH State Contact keeps a record and ongoing collaborative relationship with all HMIS Administrators and assists the projects with liaising their training and reporting needs. This level of tracking and collaboration was critical to the timely

submission of the 2023 PATH Annual Report to ensure the updated HUD data standards were completed and there was functionality to upload into the new SAMHSA PDX platform for 2023.

Section 811 Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities Program

The PA Housing Finance Agency (PHFA) and Department of Human Services is partnering to submit an application for HUD's Section 811 Program which offers assistance in placement of persons with disabilities and extremely low incomes to live in their community. to develop permanent supportive housing for extremely low-income persons with disabilities, to afford those persons an opportunity to live in safe, affordable, accessible housing that is integrated into the community. This Memorandum of Understanding coordinates the community-based services provided by DHS while utilizing PHFA's expertise in housing and housing-related issues to develop an efficient and cost-effective rental assistance program. The application was submitted to HUD prior to the February 27, 2024, deadline.

In addition, PHFA and DHS have partnered with Self Determination Housing Partnership (SDHP) to manage the 811-wait list. SDHP also works closely with Local Lead Agencies ("LLA") to identify and establish stakeholder groups to refer eligible applicants to the 811 program. SDHP will manage outreach, referrals and waiting list systems and serve as the single point of contact for housing providers, including developers, property managers and landlords.

Eligibility for the program waitlist is that a person be:

- Between 18 and 61 years of age at the time of lease up and can continue to reside in 811 funded housing after age 61
- A person with a disability as defined by the HUD 811 Definition of Disability
- Enrolled or Eligible for Medicaid
- Eligible for Long-term Services and Supports
- Gross income at or below 30% Area Median Income (AMI)
- Cannot have a criminal history that includes being a Registered Lifetime Sex offender or includes a conviction of methamphetamine possession or production

Pennsylvania has identified the following 811 eligible applicants to be prioritized in the following order:

- Priority 1 Persons who are institutionalized but able to live in the community in permanent supportive housing. Institutions include nursing facilities, private and public mental health hospitals, and intermediate care facilities.
- Priority 2 Persons who are at risk of institutionalization without permanent supportive housing. Examples may include disabled individuals living with elderly caregivers or in unstable situations, homeless.
- Priority 3 Persons who are living in a congregate setting and are seeking housing within the community. These include persons in community residential rehabilitation facilities, personal care homes and domiciliary care.

The PATH State Contact served on a workgroup of stakeholders to update the Section 811 Priority list to ensure PATH eligible individuals remained a priority and population's interests were represented in designing the eligibility for the program. If funding is awarded, the PA PATH State Contact will require all local PATH projects participate in the 811 Project Rental Assistance Overview hosted monthly by the SDHP. This will provide PATH team members an introduction to 811 Project Rental Assistance, eligibility, priority populations, application process, and the reporting requirements for service providers. This project can be apart of a network of vital lifelines to connect PATH eligible individuals with much needed affordable, safe housing.

Conclusion

In this section of the PA Intended Use Plan, we discussed collaborative opportunities for Pennsylvania's PATH projects that highlight the Commonwealth's dedication to utilizing innovative resources and strategies to serve a vulnerable population dealing with persistent and pervasive health disparities. These efforts aim to help individuals who are experiencing or are at risk of homelessness with a serious mental illness by providing safe and stable housing, improving their health, and empowering them to live a self-directed, meaningful life.

C. Veterans

Narrative Question:

2023 PA Veterans

Describe how the state gives consideration in awarding PATH funds to entities with demonstrated effectiveness in serving veterans experiencing homelessness.

The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. HUD requires that Continuums of Care (CoCs) conduct an annual count of people experiencing homelessness who are sheltered in emergency shelter, transitional housing, and Safe Havens on a single night. Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally.

According to the 2023 PIT count, 826 individuals identified as veterans of the 12,556 people in Pennsylvania that experienced homelessness on a single night in January, whether in sheltered or unsheltered settings. The PA DHS Office of Mental Health Services and Substance Abuse is continuing to encourage and support PATH programs in their efforts to prioritize veterans in need. At the local level, providers have established connections with veteran centers that often work together with PATH programs. This partnership allows veteran organizations to identify and enroll homeless veterans and connect with much-needed street outreach services. Thorough review of the Intended Use Plans will be conducted for the 2024 application to ensure that projects are continuing to prioritize veterans. The State PATH Contact strongly encourages all PATH providers to continue their special efforts to reach out to veterans, especially those who are among the unsheltered homeless.

Many PA PATH entities across Pennsylvania have established various services and programs for veterans in their Individualized Use Plans (IUPs). However, in more rural areas, PATH programs report fewer veterans are willing to engage and identify themselves as having served. To provide temporary assistance to veterans during a housing crisis, several entities are participating in collaborations for the Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program (SSVF). These veteran programs are designed to prevent homelessness and improve veteran stability. They offer various services such as outreach, case management, transportation assistance, housing counseling, financial planning, legal services, employment search assistance, life skills training, housing vouchers, temporary financial assistance, and assistance with obtaining VA and other public benefits. Additionally, aid is arranged for accessing Mental Health (MH) counseling and Drug & Alcohol (D&A) counseling as needed.

The SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR) model helps communities end homelessness through increased access to Social Security disability benefits. SOAR in Pennsylvania continues to coordinate with both VA Hospitals and SSVF grantees to provide SOAR training for those who directly serve the veteran population. Currently there are 44 individuals that have completed the SOAR training and are working for veteran serving organizations. The PATH State Contact is also the SOAR State Contact and continued training for VA Hospital staff, statewide is planned.

OMHSAS is committed to providing support and leadership to increase access to appropriate services for veterans, suicide prevention, promotion of emotional health and wellbeing, as well as reduction of homelessness among the veteran population. To achieve this goal, OMHSAS plans to continue promoting the use of PATH funding, which will help facilitate the implementation of innovative community-based solutions that foster access to evidence-based prevention, treatment, and recovery support services for military service members, veterans, and their families.

Additionally, the Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA) recognizes that sometimes unforeseen circumstances cause financial burden on veterans and their families. To help veterans falling on challenging times, the DMVA administers the Veterans Temporary Assistance (VTA) Program. The VTA provides temporary financial assistance of up to \$1,600 in a 12-month period to veterans or their surviving spouses who reside in Pennsylvania for the necessities of life (food, shelter, fuel and clothing).

D. Alignment with PATH Goals

2023 PA Alignment with PATH Goals

Describe how the services to be provided using PATH funds will target outreach and case management as priority services; including serving the most vulnerable adults who are <u>literally</u> and <u>chronically</u> homeless, and to individuals with a history of incarceration.

Pennsylvania's PATH programs are often charged with providing assistance and support to the most service resistant individuals experiencing homelessness. Street outreach is an integral component of most PATH providers in PA. PATH providers know to reach their target population, they must go to the people. Street outreach workers meet with individuals experiencing homelessness on the street, in encampments, in partnership with law enforcement and EMS, at communal free meals, shelters, mental health drop-in centers, and many other locations across the Commonwealth. The goal is to engage and encourage unsheltered individuals to accept shelter, case management, and other necessary health-related support. PATH supports are available in 33 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties, with 34 projects across the state that serve both rural and urban areas. PATH providers also receive referrals from outside agencies including crisis services, law enforcement, hospitals, etc. through established community partnerships and relationships. To ensure ease of access to PATH services, it is essential for PATH programs to maintain strong relationships with other agencies and community resources. This enables them to engage even the hardest-to-reach participants and provide them with the necessary support to access services.

Since 2001, Pennsylvania has employed a full-time State PATH Contact (SPC). The SPC oversees all activities related to the PATH program, and the current Pennsylvania SPC was brought on to OMHSAS in November 2023. She has significant experience conducting and coordinating street outreach efforts to individuals that are literally homeless. In her previous role, she has partnered with medical including dental providers, peer, behavioral health, and substance use services to bring care to those that were hardest to serve. Her background includes outreach across the spectrum of unsheltered situations from encampments to abandoned homes and buildings. She also has experience providing direct care as a permanent supportive housing case manager and supervisor of housing services for individuals that were chronically homeless with a severe mental illness. Her breadth of experience has actively reinforced the importance of PATH projects to prioritize street outreach, case management and low barrier access of services.

A thorough review by OMHSAS will be conducted of the 2024 PATH Intended Use Plans to ensure priority services are provided to individuals that are literally and chronically homeless and creative, assertive engagement techniques are employed by PATH providers. Additionally, scheduled site visits and monitoring provide a direct opportunity to examine approaches and issues that come up regarding reaching the PATH target population. Through this engagement, the SPC will discuss potential modifications and note them in the site visit report if needed.

During the 2023-2024 year, Pennsylvania had the opportunity to host four webinars for Pennsylvania PATH providers and their partners. The trainings were coordinated by C4 Innovations and OMHSAS, and were aimed at training creative, assertive and evidence-based engagement techniques, all of which are beneficial to serving those that are literally and chronically homeless and to those with a history of incarceration. All sessions were recorded and will be shared with new PATH providers as required trainings.

On November 2nd, 2023, a training session titled "Addressing Stigma in Recovery Services" was conducted virtually, and it was attended by 30 individuals from PATH projects and their partners. The purpose of this webinar was to address the negative social attitudes known as stigmas that arise due to perceived differences between groups and individuals. The webinar covered the most common types of stigmas, including appearance, behavior, beliefs, social position, and background. It also highlighted the negative effects of stigma, such as debilitating shame and isolation, particularly among those who struggle with mental health and substance use issues. The presenter provided insights into how and why stigmas are formed, and equipped the

participants with the necessary tools to identify the root causes of stigma in themselves and others, and implement strategies to resist, reduce, and eliminate stigmas.

Our second session was held on December 5th, 2023 and was titled "Using Motivational Interviewing Skills." The session was attended by 31 people virtually. The training focused on teaching Motivational Interviewing techniques which can be used as a collaborative conversation style for enhancing a person's motivation and commitment to change. Motivational Interviewing is an evidence-based approach and is relevant and valuable to practitioners of all disciplines in health and human services. During the session, the participants learned about the key concepts of Motivational Interviewing and the mindset and heart-set of this approach.

On January 11, 2024, the third virtual training session titled "Engaging People with Co-occurring Disorders" was held. The session covered the unique challenges faced by providers when working with individuals who have co-occurring disorders. It addressed the complex nature and impact of these disorders on overall functioning. The importance of integrating treatment of both conditions was also discussed, as it helps individuals identify motivational goals and strategies. During the training, the presenter discussed the treatment and support needs of people living with co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders. They offered engagement and motivational strategies to help individuals develop and achieve their own recovery goals. The training was attended by 34 individuals.

On February 6, 2024, a training session called "Principles of Trauma-Informed Supervision" was conducted, which was attended by 50 people. The training focused on the importance of providing trauma-informed supervision to foster the personal and professional growth of employees. The attendees were taught that Trauma-Informed Supervision can help improve clinical skills, implement best practices, ensure accountability, promote wellness, and most importantly, improve client outcomes. By creating an atmosphere of safety, trust, choice, and collaboration in the workplace, Trauma-Informed Supervision helps supervisors create an environment that reflects the way team members treat clients.

Currently, Pennsylvania contracts with Advocates for Human Potential (AHP) to provide one-on-one technical assistance to a rural street outreach provider. The provider is working to develop a program that will effectively reach and assist individuals experiencing homelessness, substance abuse, and mental health issues in rural areas. Due to the unique challenges of rural street outreach, it has been difficult for the provider to find solutions that work for their specific geography as most street outreach is performed primarily in urban areas. AHP has extensive experience in providing technical assistance to organizations working with vulnerable populations in a variety of settings, and their expertise has proven invaluable to the rural street outreach provider. AHP's team has been working closely with the provider to identify the unique challenges they face and develop tailored strategies to overcome them.

Through this collaboration, the provider has been able to make significant progress in building out their program. AHP has helped them navigate issues such as transportation barriers, limited access to resources, and the stigma associated with mental health and substance abuse in rural communities. AHP's support has also helped the provider establish relationships with community partners, such as local health clinics and law enforcement agencies, that are critical to the success of their program.

Overall, the collaboration between Pennsylvania, the rural street outreach provider, and AHP has been a powerful example of the positive impact that can be achieved through effective technical assistance and partnership.

The PA PATH program recently organized a two-day virtual conference for Pennsylvania's PATH providers, SPC, and other stakeholders on May 17 and 18, 2023. The conference covered several important topics that are relevant to the prioritization of individuals who are literally and chronically homeless, as well as those with a

history of incarceration. Some of the topics discussed during the conference included Outreach and Engagement Techniques, Harm Reduction, Advanced Boundaries and Ethics, Strategies for Identifying and Addressing Rural Homelessness, Falling through the Cracks: LGBTQ+ Disparities in Homelessness, De-escalation Techniques with Challenging Populations, and Homelessness Among the Forensic Population.

The Pennsylvania PATH project is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life for Pennsylvania's most vulnerable adults. The project prioritizes the enhancement of knowledge, awareness, and training to provide inclusive services that cater to the needs of Pennsylvania's adult population who are suffering from literal and chronic homelessness as well as those with a history of incarceration. The project employs a low-barrier approach to service delivery, which seeks to provide easy access to resources and support systems aimed at empowering individuals to overcome the unique challenges a person faces while experiencing literal homelessness. The PATH project adopts a person centered and client driven approach to service delivery, which seeks to empower individuals to attain their set goals and foster recovery.

The SPC aims to continue providing training and technical assistance to all PATH providers as needed and will keep engaging with providers regarding their training needs.

E. Alignment with State Comprehensive Mental Health Services Plan

The Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) is responsible for developing programs and policies, licensing service components, allocating funds for services, and creating guidelines for county service planning. OMHSAS also administer Medicaid for behavioral health, community mental health funds, Behavioral Health Services Initiative (BHSI) funds for mental health and substance abuse services for individuals who are no longer eligible for Medical Assistance, and Act 152 funds to provide non-hospital residential substance abuse services. Additionally, OMHSAS is responsible for the administration of state hospitals. Pennsylvania provides innovative support for a robust mental health service system. The estimated budget for behavioral health services for SFY23-24 is \$6.79 billion in state and federal dollars. Over the last two and a half decades, there has been significant movement shifting funding from direct control of the state government to county administrations, which allows increased flexibility at the local levels to manage resources to address the service needs of their communities. In addition to overseeing the mental health services funded with the appropriated state funds, most of the counties also serve as the primary contractors for the Behavioral Health Medicaid Managed Care Program known as Behavioral Health Health Choices.

Programs in other state agencies that have a relationship with the mental health system include the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs, Department of Aging, Department of Corrections, Department of Education, Department of Health, Department of Insurance, and Department of State as well as the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation within the Department of Labor and Industry. The Mental Health Planning Council has representatives from many of these partners, and they play an essential role in planning and developing behavioral health and substance abuse services in the state. OMHSAS uses the council and recommendations of the Mental Health Planning Council to provide better services related to mental health and substance abuse in the state.

The Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) utilizes data from several sources in order to set priorities for the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (CMHSBG) including:

- County Level Data from the County Human Services Plans
- OMHSAS Data
- Stakeholder Feedback from the Public Meetings
- Call for Change
- Consultation with Subject Matter Experts for each priority area

Homelessness remains a significant issue in numerous communities across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, particularly in rural counties. On any given day, more than 15,000 people in the state are known to be homeless, including over 8,000 individuals residing in the rural parts of the state. Homeless individuals comprise those who are living on the streets, staying with family or friends, or residing in shelters. This count encompasses both adults and children.

To serve the homeless population effectively, Pennsylvania has focused on expanding and improving community programs in every locality, including critical support services such as housing, crisis outreach, and benefit acquisition. Pennsylvania has also developed specialized outreach and supportive housing services to address the specific needs of the homeless population, utilizing state and federal funds. Each county mental health program has identified a housing specialist who receives technical assistance from OMHSAS.

In addition to federal funding, the Commonwealth has several programs through DHS to address the needs of individuals experiencing homelessness. The ones most often leveraged to address homelessness in Pennsylvania

are the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) program, Homeless Assistance Program (HAP), and SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR).

PATH serving counties and contracted providers have developed innovative programs to best serve the needs of the SMI homeless population in their geographical areas. Some recent programs have adopted evidence-based practices such as Critical Time Intervention (CTI), a time-limited evidence-based practice that mobilizes support for society's most vulnerable individuals during periods of transition. It facilitates community integration and continuity of care by ensuring that a person has enduring ties to their community and support systems during these critical periods. In general, the services provided for PATH-eligible individuals include outreach, screening and diagnostic treatment, habilitation/rehabilitation, community mental health services, alcohol and/or drug treatment, staff training, case management, supportive and supervisory services in residential settings, referrals for primary health, job training, educational services, and allowable housing services.

The PATH program in Pennsylvania is designed to align with the services and supports available through the state's behavioral health service system. Pennsylvania's Mental Health State Plan, as articulated in the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (CMHSBG) plan, outlines the role played by the local PATH providers in the development of innovative programs to address the needs of the SMI homeless populations in their respective geographical areas. The CMHSBG plan is developed in collaboration with the State Mental Health Planning Council, which ensures that due consideration is given to stakeholder input in the development of the plan. Additionally, Pennsylvania utilizes the flexibilities available in our Behavioral Health Medicaid Managed Care program to address the housing needs of eligible Medicaid beneficiaries. Pennsylvania actively promotes value-based purchasing and community-based care management in our Medicaid Managed Care program, with a strong emphasis on the social determinants of health, including housing. While Medicaid remains the primary source of funding for the behavioral health services for the Medicaid eligible population, significant funding is also available to counties through state appropriations and federal grants to provide services that are not covered through Medicaid or to cover individuals who are not eligible for Medicaid.

PATH providers offer services that complement the existing mainstream mental health efforts in Pennsylvania. Collaboration and coordination exist between mainstream mental health services and PATH services in all counties that currently receive PATH funding. The counties are responsible for delivering behavioral health services and directing the PATH programs in their respective counties to align with local needs and regulatory guidelines. The SPC, during the monitoring activities to the PATH programs and the counties, emphasizes the importance of strong collaboration that goes beyond the traditional mental health arena, to include areas such as housing, health, and vocation. Pennsylvania recognizes those who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless as a special population with unique mental health needs. The Comprehensive Mental Health Services Plan of Pennsylvania aims to provide specialized attention to this group in addition to general mental health services that are available in all 67 counties. Through site visits with county PATH coordinators, SPC ensures coordination, consistency, and collaboration with existing mental health services.

County Human Services Plans - OMHSAS allocates funds to the county governments for the provision of community mental health services. County MH/ID and D&A Programs are uniquely positioned to coordinate behavioral health services with other county human services programs. This control and authority over necessary ancillary services such as housing, family courts, and welfare programs are pivotal to a working infrastructure that can provide a seamless system of care. Counties also take leadership roles in their communities by promoting activities aimed at increasing awareness of mental illness among community human service agencies, professional personnel, and the public.

The general state revenue funds, county funds, Medicaid dollars, Mental Health Block Grant, Substance Abuse Block Grant, Social Services Block Grant, Projects Assisting the Transition from Homelessness (PATH) grant, and other federal grants comprise much of the funding pool that County MH/ID programs use to provide services to individuals in need. Some other resources available to the counties and providers include OMHSAS funded/sponsored technical assistance (TA) and training in a variety of areas. Some examples are Peer Specialist training, Case Management training, training and TA provided to PATH providers, TA in the development and advancement of evidence-based practices such as the Heads Up First Episode Psychosis technical assistance center at the University of Pennsylvania, Assertive Community Treatment training, the Youth and Family Training Institute, and TA for the development of housing options in the counties. Additionally, OMHSAS has commissioned an Electronic Learning Management System to centralize the existing state trainings and to expand training opportunities available to counties, provider agencies, and other interested stakeholders.

In their annual County Mental Health Plans, which are included in the County Human Services Plans, counties are asked to identify their top priorities to address the unmet needs identified as a part of the planning process. The counties identified funding and other resources needed to implement those recovery-oriented priorities. The top priority for FY 22-23 was including evidence-based practices; the second highest-ranked priority was Housing and Homeless Services, with Forensic, and Community education/Outreach close behind.

Other important priorities that were mentioned at a lesser frequency included Crisis Services, Inpatient/Residential Services, Suicide Prevention, Cultural and Linguistic Competence, Data Infrastructure, Integrated Physical Health Services, Education and Employment services, Peer support, trauma-informed care, and Psychiatry access. PATH serves as a bridge to mainstream resources allowing for an uninsured or underinsured individual to obtain services prior to enrollment in an individual health plan.

Mental Health Planning Council/Public Feedback - In April 2023, OMHSAS requested the Mental Health Planning Council (MHPC) selected representative members from each of the subcommittees to convene a CMHSBG Application Workgroup. The MHPC met throughout May of 2023, to review the current CMHSBG priorities and make recommendations for new priorities for the current application. OMHSAS and the MHPC worked together to take a close look at the priorities and create goals and outcomes that are realistic and will show progress in the Pennsylvania System of Mental Health. OMHSAS staff from CMHSBG, Children's Bureau, and other subject matter experts routinely attended MHPC workgroup meetings to support the council with requested data and program information. The final recommendations of the MHPC CMHSBG Application Workgroup were presented to the larger MHPC council at the August 2023 Quarterly Meeting. MHPC Quarterly Meetings are open to the public, and both appointed members and public attendees were given the opportunity to provide feedback.

Call for Change - OMHSAS initially developed the *Call for Change: Toward a Recovery-Oriented Mental Health Service System for Adults (Call for Change)* document in 2005, in partnership with a wide array of stakeholders, including representation from the MHPC. The *Call for Change* addressed the following domains towards creating a recovery-oriented mental health system:

- 1. Validated Personhood
- 2. Person-Centered Decision-Making and Choice
- 3. Connection—Community Integration and Social Relationships
- 4. Basic Life Resources
- 5. Self-Care, Wellness, and Finding Meaning
- 6. Rights and Informed Consent

- 7. Peer Support/Self-Help
- 8. Participation, Voice, Governance, and Advocacy
- 9. Treatment Services
- 10. Worker Availability, Attitude, and Competency
- 11. Addressing Coercive Practices
- 12. Outcome Evaluation and Accountability

Each of the priorities in the FY24-25 CMHSBG application works to continue making progress in the domains identified during the Call for Change process. Supportive Housing works to ensure individuals have access to basic life resources, now referred to as Social Determinants of Health. Having calls to the Suicide Prevention Lifeline answered in state allows for appropriate connection to resources within a person's own community. Family Peer Support Services, Peer Run Crisis Respite Services, and employing more peers to work in Mobile Crisis Teams will continue to grow the impact that peer support services have had on pushing the behavioral health system to be recovery-oriented and value the wisdom and knowledge gained from the lived experience of SMI/SED. Family Peer Support Services also help to ensure that the child-serving system is youth and family driven. Working to ensure mental health professionals can respond in the community to mental health crisis situations through Mobile Crisis Teams, reducing the need for police responses and emergency room boarding, making progress to reducing coercion in the mental health system, and working to ensure that individuals are able to receive the care they need in the least restrictive environment are all priorities that are addressed. Both First Episode Psychosis (FEP) Programs and Service Access for Older Adults work to ensure that, across the lifespan, individuals have access to the treatment services that they need to pursue their recovery. FEP programs are important services within the Pennsylvania mental health system to ensure access to cost-effective, quality services for youth in the least restrictive environment. OMHSAS-certified Residential Treatment Facilities becoming designated as trauma-sensitive will help youth who are often involved with child welfare and/or juvenile justice and are in, or at risk of, out-of-home placement.

OMHSAS and the MHPC will continue to work to ensure that CMHSBG priorities in the future align with the recovery and resiliency efforts and continue to work towards Pennsylvanians with SMI/SED having access to quality services that empower them to live full and fulfilling lives within their communities of choice.

Consolidated Plan - Additionally, PATH was included in the Pennsylvania's 2019-2023 Consolidated Plan and the 2024-2028 plan. The Consolidated Plan for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (Consolidated Plan) describes the efforts of the Commonwealth in addressing the housing, community, homeless, and economic development needs of its constituents. The Consolidated Plan is intended to outline the goals, strategies, and resources to be utilized in addressing those needs as well as related information on performance in realizing these goals. Each year the Commonwealth is required to submit an Annual Action Plan based on the goals of the Consolidated Plan as part of its application process to HUD. The Consolidated Plan was discussed in depth under the collaboration of service provision with the department/office responsible for providing housing section of this IUP. Although Pennsylvania's Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) is responsible for the Consolidated Plan, OMHSAS is also involved in its development.

The Plan's major goal is to reduce homelessness for all populations throughout the Commonwealth. To achieve this goal, DCED relies on the actions of 16 CoCs to address the economic, social, and health problems of the homeless populations in their respective regions. The CoC Homeless Steering Committee meets monthly and includes representation from numerous Commonwealth departments that have a vested interest in ending homelessness. DHS/OMHSAS is an active member of this steering committee. Through OMHSAS' ongoing representation and communication with the CoCs and funding sources, the PATH population and their needs are continually represented in broader planning initiatives.

Local Housing Options Team - Local Housing Options Team (LHOT) is a diverse group of both housing and service provider professionals who meet monthly encouraging cross-sector collaborative housing projects and planning activities for all in need of safe, affordable and/or accessible housing. PA OMHSAS provides technical assistance to 44 LHOTs operating in 54 of the 67 counties. County team membership includes representatives from the County Office of Mental Health, Public Housing Authority and other public and private agencies. The groups meet regularly to plan for increased availability of accessible, affordable housing opportunities for people with mental illness. The major purpose of the LHOT is to bring together the key stakeholders in the community to identify the housing needs of people with disabilities and to take action to meet those needs.

Any local agency that is willing to dedicate time and administrative support to the LHOT may serve as facilitator. In many of the LHOTs, these roles are assumed by the County Mental Health Housing Specialist who is also the county PATH coordinator, if the county receives PATH funding. Many of these LHOTS are also involved in their Continuums of Care, thus providing more cooperation between providers and agencies.

Once the Pennsylvania PATH application has been completed, it is made available to all interested parties for public review and comment. This is done by sending the application to the PA OMHSAS listserv and posting the application on the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services - Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse / Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) webpage (<u>https://www.dhs.pa.gov</u>) where it remains available and open for public comment for approximately 10 days. During this time, individuals are encouraged to provide feedback and suggestions on the application.

After the feedback period has ended, all the gathered information is compiled and carefully reviewed. Feedback is then incorporated into the PATH application as necessary. By doing so, we can ensure that the application is as comprehensive and effective as possible, and that it meets the needs of all those who rely on the service.

It is highly recommended that the service plan development of both the Consolidated Plan and the County Human Service Plans be inclusive of PATH, in order to effectively address the issues faced by individuals experiencing homelessness and those living with serious mental illness. These planning documents present a valuable opportunity for interested parties, including family members, individuals receiving services, the general public, as well as providers of mental health, substance use, and housing services to provide input and make recommendations. By incorporating PATH into these plans, stakeholders are afforded the opportunity to provide meaningful feedback that can be used to develop effective solutions.

The Consolidated Plan is accessible at all 67 County Commissioners' offices, the six regional offices of DCED, and Pennsylvania's 28 District Libraries. A concise summary of the Action Plan is published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin for public comment, and public meetings are organized to address questions and recommendations. Recently, the state has expanded its public participation process for the Consolidated Plan by conducting online public meetings, which provides more opportunities for the public to participate.

PATH activities can be included in County Human Service plans since PATH funds are allocated to County MH/ID programs by OMHSAS. It is mandatory for all County MH/ID programs to hold advertised and announced public hearings on their proposed annual plans and to document the meetings, attendees, and comments received. These public hearing forums are attended by stakeholders, including consumers, advocates, and other interested parties, who take the opportunity to provide comments and raise relevant issues.

Additionally, PATH activities and proposed uses of PATH funds are described in the documents developed for discussion and approval by the members of the Pennsylvania State Mental Health Advisory Committees (Adult, Older adult, and Children's committees). These committees have the responsibility for development and approval of the Mental Health Services Block Grant application annually. At least 51% of the members on these advisory committees are mental health consumers and family members nominated by representative constituent organizations.

G. Programmatic and Financial Oversight

There are two primary mediums used for programmatic and financial oversight of PATH providers: the State PATH Contact and County PATH Coordinators.

State PATH Contact (SPC) - Since 2001, Pennsylvania has employed a full-time State PATH Contact. The SPC oversees all activities related to the PATH program. The SPC monitors the 34 PATH projects biennially for fiscal and programmatic fidelity. County MH/ID offices, as well as the local programs with which they sub-contract are both subject to oversight. Monitoring of Pennsylvania PATH projects is completed via in person site visits in which the SPC assesses the fidelity of each project utilizing a variety of mixed methods. A pre-visit PATH specific Site Visit Questionnaire is provided to each provider to complete at least 30 days prior to the inperson visit. This allows for the SPC to prepare for the visit by understanding the current operational model and potential needs of the program. A Site Visit Guide that outlines the expectations of pre-visit activity and the visit itself is provided. Additionally, the PATH Site Visit Monitoring Tool, PATH Record Review Worksheet, and PATH Record Review Worksheet Guide is provided in advance to provide the opportunity for projects to review the methods that will be utilized for assessment.

The SPC ensures PATH-funded programs truly understand and reflect the philosophy of service to the SMI homeless population. Site visits are conducted in a very structured manner and typically involve meetings with the County MH/ID Administrator or designee, the County PATH coordinator, fiscal contact, CEO or designee of the contracted PATH agency, agency PATH coordinator and case managers who work with PATH consumers. Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) teams conducting county site visits typically include the State PATH Contact, a representative from the fiscal office and a representative from OMHSAS field offices. In addition to meetings with the county and PATH agency staff, the OMHSAS team interviews consumers, reviews charts and visits other community agencies where PATH consumers receive services. A detailed report is prepared and provided to the county after each site visit. This report includes recommendations and when appropriate, a corrective action plan. The SPC conducts follow-up and monitoring to ensure ongoing compliance.

Additionally, since Pennsylvania provides funds through intermediary organizations via the County MH/ID Programs, Counties/Joinders are required to submit to OMHSAS the following documentation at least 30 days prior to the monitoring visit:

- 1. Recent contract with the provider(s)
- 2. Fiscal reports required from the provider(s)
- 3. Fiscal monitoring schedule
- 4. Fiscal monitoring program
- 5. Most recent fiscal monitoring report
- 6. Current A-133 audits and follow up with provider, i.e., corrective action, management decisions

The PATH provider agency must also make available the following to OMHSAS at least 30 days prior to the monitoring visit for SPC and OMHSAS Fiscal review:

- 1. If applicable, agreement with any subcontractors to provide PATH services
- 2. Most recent A-133 audit or independent audit of the provider's organization
- 3. Schedule of expenditures to support the most recent payment from county/joinder of PATH funds

2023 PA Programmatic and Financial Oversight

Throughout the project year, PATH providers are required to submit to their SPC on a quarterly basis a standardized report that reflects their cumulative fiscal spending based on their annual Intended Use Plan budget approved by SAMHSA. This information is also shared with OMHSAS' fiscal office for ongoing tracking.

Ongoing phone and email contacts with projects regularly occur throughout each month for all projects. In addition to reviewing services and budgets for compliance, the SPC examines program strengths, goals, and areas for additional development.

County PATH Coordinators - To ensure compliance, each county in Pennsylvania has a designated County PATH Coordinator who serves as the local lead and point of contact for the State PATH Contact (SPC). This county position is in place even when the county MH/ID offices contract with other agencies to provide PATH services. The county PATH coordinators work closely with the contracted agencies to develop strategic plans based on local needs and implement new programs, as well as oversee the existing projects for quality and compliance. Thus, Pennsylvania has a two-tiered oversight mechanism, one at the county MH/ID level and another at the state level. The County PATH Coordinator serves as the local lead point of accountability for the coordination and communication of PATH services.

H. Selection of PATH Local-Area Providers

Pennsylvania allocates a substantial amount of PATH funds to those areas that have the highest concentration of homeless individuals with a serious mental illness. These areas include the more urban and densely populated counties such as Allegheny County (which includes the City of Pittsburgh) and Philadelphia County (which includes the City of Pittsburgh) and Philadelphia County (which includes the City of Philadelphia) as well as other counties with significant urban centers in the state. While these counties demonstrate a high need, attention is given to the rural counties as well. The tables below demonstrate the number of people experiencing homelessness by CoC with PATH serving counties highlighted in yellow.

PATH funds are allocated by the state to county MH/ID programs on an annual basis. In order to ensure program stability, once a county establishes a PATH program or adds PATH funded services to an existing program, funding to that county is continued as long as compliance with PATH requirements are met.

Many of the county MH/ID programs that receive PATH grant funds will sub-contract with local providers to offer PATH services. Close coordination is maintained between the OMHSAS State PATH Contact, county PATH coordinators and local PATH providers contracted by the County MH/ID offices. The Intended Use Plans (IUPs) provide additional information on the programs provided.

When the PATH grant originally started in 1990, thirteen PA counties were awarded PATH funds based on the reported prevalence of homelessness in PA at that time. Since there were no specific statewide counts, useful statistics that would demonstrate need were not available at that time. National studies and available local data resources around Pennsylvania were what was available to examine homelessness and estimate the number of homeless individuals with a serious mental illness. This combination of data sources provided the basis for the selection of the original thirteen PATH counties that ranked the highest per capita for the presence of individuals who were homeless and had a serious mental illness.

Since then, Pennsylvania added new PATH programs and services using a competitive process requiring responses to issued Requests for Proposals (RFPs). In FY 2009-10, Pennsylvania added five completely new PATH programs in the state. In FY 2010-11, additional funding was received, and RFPs were open to both existing as well as new counties/joinders. With the second RFP, two PATH programs were funded in counties that did not previously have a PATH program, while three PATH programs were funded in counties that already had PATH programs (who were able to demonstrate the need for more funding/programs for the PATH population).

In 2023, OMHSAS received an increase in funding through the PATH grant which allowed for one additional PATH program to be funded in rural Centre County, which is a part of the Western CoC. PA-601 reports the fourth highest number of individuals experiencing homelessness in Pennsylvania. The PATH program was selected through a competitive process that was sent to all counties and intended to target counties without existing PATH projects. With the addition of one new PATH county, OMHSAS now contracts with 25 County MH/ID program offices to provide PATH services. These 25 county MH/ID offices provide PATH services in 33 of the state's 67 counties.

According to the Homeless Data Exchange, as reported in the 2023 PIT count, we can see that PATH counties are serving eight out of the ten highest areas for individuals reporting SMI/COD and experiencing homelessness. In addition, the tables below indicate that eight out of the ten CoCs with the highest number of individuals experiencing homelessness and chronic homelessness in Pennsylvania are also served by PATH

programs. If in the future more funding becomes available for PATH, we will continue to use a data-driven process to target areas with the highest number of individuals experiencing homelessness, chronic homelessness, SMI, and COD.

- A homeless individual with a disability as defined in section 401(9) of the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11360(9)), who:
 - Lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter, and
 - Has been homeless and living as described for at least 12 months* or on at least 4 separate occasions in the last 3 years, as long as the combined occasions equal at least 12 months and each break in homelessness separating the occasions included at least 7 consecutive nights of not living as described.
- An individual who has been residing in an institutional care facility for less, including jail, substance abuse or mental health treatment facility, hospital, or other similar facility, for fewer than 90 days and met all of the criteria of this definition before entering that facility**; or
- A family with an adult head of household (or, if there is no adult in the family, a minor head of household) who meets all of the criteria of this definition, including a family whose composition has fluctuated while the head of household has been homeless.

*A "break" in homeless is considered to be 7 or more nights.

**An individual residing in an institutional care facility does not constitute a break in homelessness.

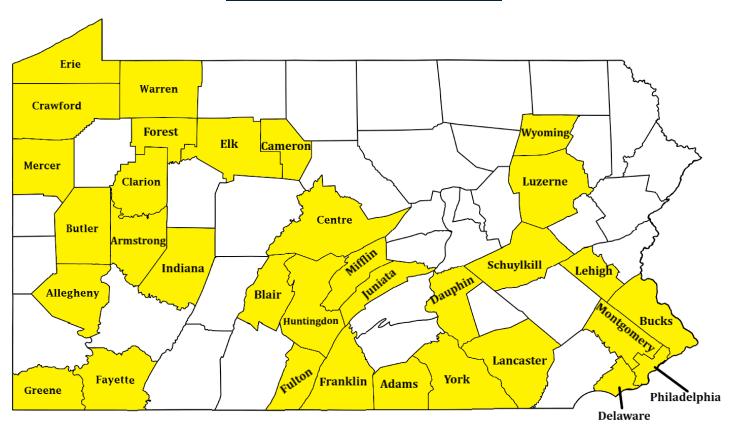

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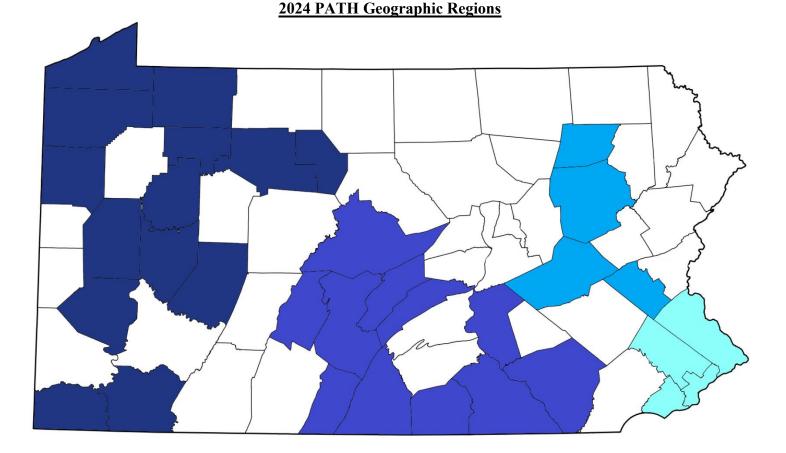

The Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS) Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) partners with 33 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties to provide PATH services. Some counties utilize a joinder system to pool services and resources across multiple counties under one local government entity. Pennsylvania contracts with 25 local Mental Health/Intellectual Disability (MH/ID) county/joinder program offices to distribute PATH funds and assist with monitoring the 34 PATH projects across the Commonwealth to ensure each project is meeting local community service gaps and needs.

The PATH programs are divided into 4 distinct regions including: Western, Central, Northeast, and Southeast. These regions were chosen as they offer similar geographical and socioeconomic challenges unique to their region. The State PATH Coordinator is interested in building upon the PATH regional relationships by bringing together each region for collaborative learning and forming PATH Communities of Practice to promote peer to peer learning and promotion of best practices.





Western Region

Encompasses Urban, rural and suburban counties. These counties are Allegheny, Armstrong-Indiana, Butler, Cameron-Elk, Clarion, Crawford, Erie, Fayette, Forest-Warren, Greene and Mercer.



Central Region

This region encompasses rural, urban and suburban counties. Counties included in this region include, Blair, Dauphin, Franklin-Fulton, Huntington-Mifflin-Juniata, Lancaster and York-Adams.



Northeast Region

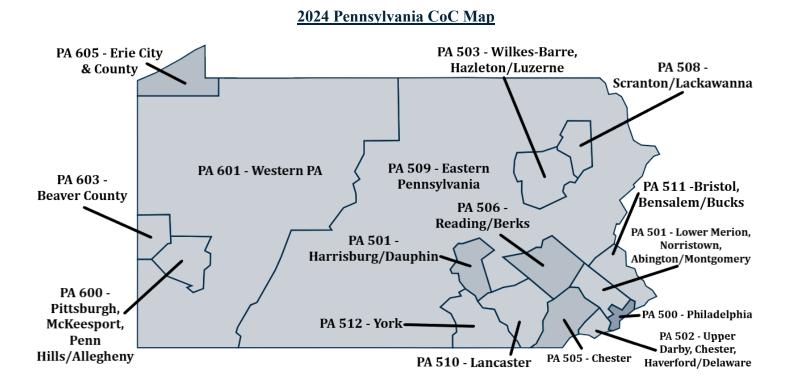
This region encompasses rural, urban and suburban counties. There are three PATH counties in the region; Lehigh, Luzerne-Wyoming and Schuylkill.



Southeast Region

This regions is located in the southeast corner of the state. It encompasses primarily urban and suburban counties. The PATH counties in this region include Bucks, Delaware, Montgomery and Philadelphia.

A Continuum of Care (CoC) is a regional or local planning body that coordinates housing and services funding for homeless families and individuals. Of the 16 CoCs across the state, 12 have active PATH projects that play an integral role in provision of services.

2023 Chronic Substance Abuse in Pennsylvania by CoC with PATH Region

The data presented above was collected on a single night during the last week in January 2023, in most cases, the night of January 25, 2023. Each CoC in Pennsylvania provided the data collected for submission to HUD on the 2023 Homeless Data Exchange (HDX), which is the reporting software used to report on Housing Inventory and Populations and Subpopulations for the McKinney-Vento/HEARTH Continuum of Care (CoC) application process. The number of individuals experiencing homelessness who report a serious mental illness or chronic substance abuse, includes all people with serious mental illness or chronic substance abuse who were in an

Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, or Safe Haven program and those who were unsheltered on the night of each CoC's 2023 Point-in-Time count.

While the Homeless Subpopulations Chart in the Homeless Data Exchange is the primary data source available at the present time for information regarding SMI and Substance Use, OMHSAS continues to recognize the following limitations:

- 1. This data is collected through a Point-in-Time count and does not reflect the total number of individuals experiencing homelessness over the course of a year.
- 2. The data is based on HUD's very specific definition of homelessness those living in emergency shelters, transitional housing for individuals experiencing homelessness, safe havens for individuals experiencing homelessness and in places not intended for human habitation (unsheltered). This definition is more restrictive than the PATH definition which is more expansive in scope and also allows for service to those at risk of homelessness.
- 3. The data on the number of individuals with serious mental illness is often self-reported by the individuals being surveyed or by shelter staff and outreach workers through observation. Oftentimes, individuals do not disclose SMI during a self-report interview due to stigma and distrust which can skew results.
- 4. The subpopulations reported do not include co-occurring disorders rather HUD collects data on individuals that identify with "chronic substance abuse." The stigma attached to this language can skew results towards lessening the number of individuals that self-disclose.

2023 HMIS Participation

All Pennsylvania PATH providers are fully participating in the Homeless Management Information System.

The Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development has established a Homeless Management Information System, known as PA HMIS, for 54 counties included in the Eastern and Western CoC regions of Pennsylvania; while nine of the other ten urban, or proprietary, counties/joinders established their own HMIS system. The remaining proprietary county chose to employ PA HMIS for their Continuum of Care.

OMHSAS entered into an agreement with DCED in FY 2012-13, to develop the PA HMIS to include PATH specific data elements. In August of 2013, the PATH data elements were fully integrated into the PA HMIS with many providers entering data into the system as early as September 2013. All PATH HMIS software vendors maintain and modify their systems to be fully compliant with the PATH HMIS. This includes incorporating the periodic updates to the PATH HMIS data standards collection, released by HUD.

The various Continuums of Care have made significant progress in upgrading their systems to meet changing HUD data quality standards and in achieving full participation. Even with system upgrades, domestic violence programs are not covered by the HMIS, so there remains a need for a manual point in time count of a portion of homeless programs in each CoC.

Continued Training

Pennsylvania has implemented several methods to ensure ongoing training for its Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). The Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to provide online and onsite training on PA HMIS. DCED has also offered free technical assistance to provider agencies for HMIS implementation and remediation that are not contracted with their HMIS system directly. OMHSAS will utilize federal PATH funds to pay for continued PA HMIS licenses and system enhancements as necessary.

Secondly, each new PATH HMIS user is trained on their respective Continuum of Care (CoC) system upon hiring. The training is conducted by County PATH Coordinators and/or PATH supervisors at the agency level. DCED has compiled a comprehensive educational base, which includes webinars, desk guides, tutorials, and a sandbox training environment for PA HMIS users.

The PA SPC disseminates HMIS updates to all PATH team members and HMIS Administrators via email. During the 2023 State PATH Conference, various representatives from PA HMIS and other systems spoke about HMIS integration for PATH providers.

Additionally, the SPC strongly encourages all proprietary HMIS systems to have a written manual for reference by both seasoned and new PATH providers. The SPC conducts random quality tests with HMIS reports to identify trends and issues and follows up with PATH provider's and county/joinders to identify strengths and areas of improvement.

New for 2024, all PATH recipients must submit required progress reporting in the PATH Data Exchange.

2023 HMIS Participation

- 1st Progress Report should include data from 7/1/23 3/31/24 and should be submitted by 5/1/24 for review.
- 2nd Progress Report should include data from 7/1/23 6/30/24 and should be submitted by 8/1/24 for review.

Annual PATH provider data reports must be reviewed and approved by the State PATH Contact (SPC) prior to submission and providers are already aware the due date for Pennsylvania providers is December 1, 2024. The State Contact will review all Pennsylvania annual reports and submit to SAMHSA by December 30, 2024. If a new user account is required, providers are required to email the PA State PATH Contact to request access and discuss training materials. The PDX User Guide for Providers 2023 has been disseminated to providers via calendar invites corresponding to the due dates of the 2 progress reports and Annual Report.

PATH providers are also reminded of the Government Performance and Reporting Accountability (GPRA) data reporting requirements in HMIS. They are trained this information is populated from HMIS data and will pull into a PATH Annual Report which can be run from the respective CoC HMIS system.

The following GPRA measures are reported annually.

- Number of homeless persons contacted;
- Number of PATH providers trained on SOAR to ensure eligible homeless clients are receiving benefits;
- Percentage of enrolled homeless persons in the PATH program who receive community mental health services; and
- Percentage of contacted homeless persons with serious mental illness who become enrolled in services.

SAMHSA also requires states to report data for the following three outcome measures:

- Number of persons referred to and attaining housing;
- Number of persons referred to and attaining mental health services; and
- Number of persons referred to and attaining substance use disorder services.

SPC will utilize the PDX Progress Reports to assess ongoing quality improvement for projects and coordinate with local county/joinders and providers as appropriate to ensure all projects are performing at or above GPRA standards.

The SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR) effort in Pennsylvania is an initiative designed to increase access to SSI/SSDI for eligible adults who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness and have a mental illness, medical impairment, and/or a co-occurring substance use disorder.

Individuals interested in training are encouraged to reach out to the State Lead and SOAR TA Center Liaison using the contact information listed on the public SAMHSA SOAR in PA website. Local PA SOAR Leads help with training and SOAR network building around the state, and their information can be found on the SAMHSA SOAR site as well. When individuals reach out to the State Team Lead for information on their local SOAR initiative, they are encouraged to connect to their local lead for information about SOAR in their area.

Expectations of Participation in SOAR

Individuals may become eligible to utilize the SOAR model by completing the SOAR Online Course. All PATH projects are encouraged to have at least one SOAR trained caseworker. Prior to beginning the online curriculum, individuals are encouraged to contact the State Team Lead or SOAR TA Center to discuss their training needs and expectations.

Expectations of SOAR-trained Caseworkers

- Serve as appointed representative for the purpose of applying for SSI/SSDI. Representation includes "standing in" for the applicant, responding to questions, receiving copies of all mail sent to the applicant, and communicating back and forth with the Social Security Administration (SSA) and the Bureau of Disability Determination (BDD).
- Complete the applications for both SSI and SSDI.
- Collect medical records from providers who have treated the applicant over the last two years.
- Write a comprehensive SOAR Medical Summary Report that includes psychosocial, treatment, and functional information that is co-signed, if at all possible, by a physician or psychologist who has seen the individual.
- Conduct ongoing outreach and engagement with the individual to stay connected throughout the process and to work with the individual to obtain other needed services and treatment such as housing, physical and mental health care, other support services, food, and clothing.
- Track applications and outcomes, including number of applications completed, approvals/denials, and time to decision from application submission to receipt of SSA's decision.
- Report outcomes on at least an annual basis within the stated timeframes as requested.
- No fees will be collected for completion of the application.
- Actively collaborate with local SOAR Leads.
- Participate in refresher courses and quality reviews of applications. SOAR caseworkers are encouraged to send redacted versions of their first few Medical Summary Reports to the SOAR TA Center for quality review before submission to BDD.

The ability to submit SOAR applications is contingent upon following the local SOAR process.

Individuals who have received SOAR training will have access to the State Team Lead, the SOAR TA Center Liaison, and Local SOAR Leads. Any of these individuals can be contacted for information or assistance regarding SOAR and can help connect individuals to SSA and BDD offices in the state. The state SOAR team also provides on-site training, including SOAR fundamental refresher courses, technical assistance, and the implementation of a collaborative local process that includes state-specific SOAR guidelines. Additional training can be provided upon request. To develop SOAR initiatives across the Commonwealth, various funding streams are utilized, including sources such as the Staunton grant, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's Cooperative Agreements to Benefit Homeless Individuals (CABHI), and various foundations.

Outcomes Tracking

Training in the use of the SOAR Online Application Tracking program is available and is required by SOAR caseworkers in Pennsylvania. The SOAR TA Center can answer questions about the OAT system as it is expected that SOAR-trained caseworkers will enter data about their SSI/SSDI applications using the SOAR model as they complete each application. The SOAR TA Center will review data periodically and follow up with SOAR caseworkers and the State SOAR Contact regarding this data and quality review of applications.

2023 Pennsylvania SOAR Initiative

Pennsylvania has a history of a strong SOAR (SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery) program. In 2023, 17 of the 35 PATH providers had at least one SOAR-trained staff member. The State PATH Contact, who is also the SOAR State Lead, will continue to work with all PATH providers to encourage having at least one SOAR-trained staff within each PATH program across the state or to have an established system in place to access SOAR services when needed.

Additionally for 2023, Pennsylvania continues to show the most consistency and impact, receiving 4,760 cumulative decisions and maintaining 90 percent approval rates on all SOAR assisted applications across the Commonwealth. Allegheny County broke the \$6,000,000 barrier for annual cumulative benefits paid from 7/1/2022– 6/30/2023. The Pittsburgh Mercy program has now exceeded \$23,000,000 in aggregate benefits paid. The Homeless Advocacy Project (HAP) out of Philadelphia continues to use pro bono attorneys and paralegals to expand the capacity of their SOAR program while also conducting training and refresher courses to promote the use of SOAR. The SOAR program in Montgomery County exceeded their goals regarding the number of individuals served and applications submitted. Word of their success has spread, resulting in referrals from additional community providers serving individuals experiencing homelessness.

There are currently eight strong SOAR local leads throughout the state, including the Philadelphia and Pittsburgh areas. Quarterly SOAR local lead conference calls have been implemented to promote information sharing and ensure statewide cohesion of the SOAR process. Recent collaboration with the Social Security Administration and Disability Determination Services will serve to improve the implementation of the model in PA.

The creation of a SOAR database had been approved for funding through Community Mental Health Services Block Grant funds. The database will feature essential SOAR provider information such as location, the scope of SOAR practice, organization name, contact information, etc., to efficiently match those in need with proper SOAR resources. Similar information on PATH providers would also be included to heighten the effectiveness of the data to be queried, as well as for more efficient distribution of materials and procedural updates. This project had been initiated but was placed on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It will be reevaluated and commenced in the future.

Future SOAR Endeavors

On February 29, 2024, OMHSAS issued a public Community Survey to gauge interest in an opportunity for SOAR On-Site Technical Assistance for Providers. OMHSAS in collaboration with the SAMHSA SOAR Technical Assistance Center, will offer on-site technical assistance (TA) to communities that are interested in SOAR implementation, expansion, and training. The Technical Assistance will likely occur in May or June 2024, and will require coordination and commitment from the community to support the planning, identifying participants, and coordinating on-site logistics.

OMHSAS strongly encouraged any provider or entity with a stake in assisting adults, children and families experiencing or at-risk of homelessness to consider completing the survey to help plan the logistics and the rollout of the technical assistance.

Examples of TA being offered are:

- A half or full-day SOAR implementation meeting (designed to plan for SOAR implementation, this TA is extremely effective when launching or relaunching a SOAR initiative and will require system-level community and agency leadership to attend)
- Trainings targeted to SOAR case workers such as a SOAR Online Course Review Session, or critical component-specific training (this TA is only available to communities with SOAR-trained case workers who are actively completing applications)
- Smaller community or agency wide meetings to plan for SOAR implementation.

After the community survey has concluded in early April, the SAMHSA SOAR TA Center and State SOAR Lead will review the results to identify the current needs and capacity of a community for outreach and engagement. The SOAR State Lead has already started identifying the locations of active trained SOAR caseworkers and tracking outcomes in OAT to understand the regional needs of different communities to identify priority regions for onsite assistance.

Moreover, the SOAR State Lead is a part of the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services Housing Strategy Internal Steering Committee for 2024-2029. As part of this initiative, the SOAR State Team Lead is working on building partnerships with jails and correctional facilities to establish a SOAR program for disabled individuals seeking SSI/SSD applications before release. This process takes several months to receive a determination, which could leave the disabled individuals at risk of homelessness upon release. The SOAR program can help these individuals obtain income upon release and avoid an imminent housing crisis.

2023 PATH Eligibility and Enrollment

Describe how PATH eligibility is determined, when enrollment occurs, and how eligibility is documented.

In Pennsylvania, the PATH Data Collection Workflow is used to determine the eligibility and enrollment of individuals who want to access PATH services. This process involves collecting information from each contact with the provider to identify if the person has a serious mental illness or cooccurring disorder and is experiencing homelessness, or if they are at imminent risk of homelessness. Providers utilize the Pennsylvania State Operational Definitions provided previously in this application to determine eligibility. The provider also checks if the individual is 18 years or older.

Clinical PATH staff conduct clinical assessments to determine PATH eligibility. All other PATH staff must assess eligibility through observation and conversation, and the justification must be clearly documented in the individual record and once enrolled transferred to HMIS until a clinical assessment can be made. The assessment does not have to be of a clinical nature, and neither HUD nor SAMHSA have established minimum criteria for what the assessment must include, other than the individual deliberately engaging with the staff to resolve the housing crisis.

Once a client is identified as PATH-eligible, the provider begins to build a relationship with them during an engagement phase. This phase aims to create a strong foundation for a thorough client assessment. During this time, the provider will interact with the client and collect necessary information to create a better understanding of the client's situation.

If the client agrees to accept PATH services, the provider will ask them to sign enrollment forms and HMIS releases. More detailed information about the client is then entered into HMIS, and an individual plan is drafted. This plan is tailored to the client's unique situation and includes goals and strategies to address their needs. At this point, a formal diagnosis is sought via a licensed practitioner of the healing arts to include in the individual record documenting a formal SMI. This process aids in connecting individuals with SMI to mainstream services that oftentimes require a formal psychiatric diagnosis of SMI that is much more stringent than allowed by the PATH program.

PATH case managers must ensure that PATH-enrolled individuals get the services and supports that they need and want through a collaborative, person-centered, and planned approach. The case manager assesses the needs and wants of the individual and, where appropriate, arranges, coordinates and advocates for delivery and access to a range of programs and services designed to meet the individual's needs.

Additionally, PATH eligibility is logged in HMIS to ensure that the client's information is up-to-date and accurate. By collecting all necessary information throughout the process with PATH, the provider can offer the best possible services to the client.
